

## Definitions and Sources of Data

**Demographics** are the estimated number and percent of total individuals in Maine as of July 1, 2004, and the estimated number of individuals in various sub-age groupings within this estimated total population. The estimated number of individuals is determined by extrapolating from the 2000 Census and taking into account births, deaths, and net migrations. ### PHYSICAL AND MENTAL HEALTH

**Children Participating in MaineCare, SFY 2006** is the estimated number and percent of children age 0 through 18 eligible for Medicaid during the state fiscal year. Data are reported by the child's county of residence at the time eligibility is determined. SOURCE: Maine Department of Health and Human Services, Office of MaineCare Services

**Live Births For Which Prenatal Care Began in the First Trimester, 2004** is the number and percent of live births during the calendar year for which the mother began receiving prenatal care during the first three months of pregnancy. **Low Birth-weight Infants, 2004** is the number and percent of live births occurring during the calendar year in which the newborn weighed less than 2500 grams (5.5 pounds). SOURCE: Maine Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Data, Research and Vital Statistics

**Infant Mortality, 2000-2004 annual average** is the number of deaths occurring to infants under 1 year of age averaged over the five-year period from 1999-2003, and the number of these infant deaths per 1,000 live births occurring during the same time period. The data are reported by place of residence, not place of death. SOURCE: Maine Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Data, Research and Vital Statistics

**Child Deaths, 2000-2004 annual average** is the number of deaths from all causes to children age 1 through 14 averaged over the five-year period from 1999-2003, and the number of these deaths per 10,000 children in this age range averaged over the same time period. The data are reported by place of residence, not place of death. SOURCE: Maine Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Data, Research and Vital Statistics

**Teen Deaths, 2000-2004 annual average** is the number of deaths from all causes to teens age 15 through 19 averaged over the five-year period from 1999-2003, and the number of these deaths per 10,000 children in this age range averaged over the same time period. The data are reported by place of residence, not the place of death. SOURCE: Maine Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Data, Research and Vital Statistics

### SOCIAL AND ECONOMIC STATUS

**Children in Poverty, 2004** is the estimated number and percent of children age 0 through 17 who were living in poverty during the calendar year. **Children Receiving TANF, December 2006** is the number and percent of children age 0 through 17 who were receiving Temporary Aid to Needy Families during the month. SOURCE: Maine Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Integrated Access and Support

**Children Receiving Food Stamps, December 2006** is the number and percent of children age 0 through 17 who were receiving Food Stamp benefits during the month. SOURCE: Maine Department of Health and Human Services, Office of Integrated Access and Support

**School Children Receiving Subsidized School Lunch, 2006-07** is the number of school children receiving subsidized school lunches through the National School Lunch Program during the school year, and the percent of these children in comparison to the total public school enrollment during the same time period. The National School Lunch Program is a meal entitlement plan primarily funded through federal dollars. All elementary and junior high schools are required to participate in the program. In Maine, high schools have the option of participating. School children are eligible for free school lunches if their family income does not exceed 130% of the federal poverty level. They are eligible for reduced price school lunches if their family income falls between 130% and 185% of the federal poverty level. SOURCE: Maine Department of Education, School Nutrition Program. **Estimated Livable Wage for a Single-parent Family of 3, 2004** is the estimated hourly wage required to meet the basic expenses for a single-parent, three-person family. A livable wage is calculated by dividing the total expenses in a basic needs budget by the number of hours that make up a year of full-time work. **Median Household Income, 2004** is the estimated median household income modeled from combined census estimates, current population surveys, and other administrative and economic data. The median income is the dollar amount which divides the income distribution into two equal groups - half with income above the median and half with income below it. **Unemployment, 2005** is the number of unemployed persons age 16 and over averaged over the calendar year by summing the number of unemployed people for each month and dividing by 12. The percent is the average number of unemployed people divided by the average number of people in the civilian labor force. **Domestic Assaults Reported to Police, 2005** is the number and rate of assaults reported to police that were perpetrated by family or household members who are or were married or living together in a romantic relationship, natural parents of the same child (whether or not the couple ever lived together) or other adult family members related by blood or marriage. The rate is per 100,000 of the population. These are not unduplicated counts and may include numerous assaults affecting the same individuals. **Arrests of Children, 2005** is the number of arrests of children age 10 through 17 during the calendar year, including repeat offenses for the same individual, and the number of these arrests per 1,000 children in the same age range during the same time period. **Arrests of Children for Crimes Against Persons, 2005** is the number of arrests of children age 10 through 17 for crimes against individuals (murder and non-negligent manslaughter, forcible rape, and robbery) during the calendar year, including repeat offenses for the same individual, and the number of these arrests per 1,000 children in the same age range during the same time period. ### EDUCATION AND LEARNING

**Public High School Graduates, Class of 2005** is the number of students who graduated from their high school rather than dropping out of school sometime during their high school years, and the percent of these students in comparison to the total class (graduates plus the number of all dropouts during the 9th, 10th, 11th and 12th grade years of this graduating class). A separate completion rate is calculated for each graduating class, such as the "Class of 2004." SOURCE: Maine Department of Education, Division of Management Information. **Public High School Dropouts, 2004-05** is the number of public high school students who have withdrawn or been expelled from high school before graduating or completing of a program of studies and who have not enrolled in another educational institution or program, and the percent of these students in comparison to the total number of students enrolled in public high school. Each local educational unit submits a dropout report to the Department of Education as of the last day of school with a count of all students who dropped out during the previous calendar year. **Public High School Graduates Planning to Attend Post-secondary School, 2005** is the number of public high school graduates (regular diploma, other diploma or certificate of completion during the previous school year or subsequent summer school) who intend to or who are enrolled full- or part-time in post-secondary education according to a survey administered by the local educational unit and submitted in the fall following graduation, and the percent of these students in comparison to the total number of students who graduated. **Special Education: Students with Disabilities Age 3-21, 2005-06** is the number of students age 3-21 who have disabilities requiring the provision of special education services and who are counted on December 1 of the school year as enrolled in special education in schools and individual education programs in Maine, and the percent of these students in comparison to the total number of students counted as enrolled in regular education on October 1 of the school year. The special education child count is completed by school administrative units, approved state operated or state supported schools, and Child Development Services sites.
